News From the Naturalist - Beth Bartoli

Though there are still signs that winter hasn't quite left us, spring will be upon us before we know it. When late winter storms gave the park fresh snow, folks came out for winter sports and enjoyed cross country skiing, snow shoeing and hiking. Unfortunately, rain and ice usually followed the snow, so we had to deal with slippery, sometimes hazardous conditions. Such is winter life in Wisconsin. Some of us like the quiet & cold of winter. But most of us don't want it in April!

Quiet sports, a quiet time of year and fewer visitors means time to get caught up. Typically, winter is not a time of year for a lot of park programs, but I have been fortunate to spend some time at Newport this winter.

Some of our winter programs were:

- Star Counts for International Dark Sky designation.

 The star counts proved to be challenging weather wise, but we got them done. Our application has been sent off, so now we wait for news of being accepted as the first park in WI (and only the second in the Midwest) to achieve International Dark Sky Park status.
- Winter Tree Identification taught by arborist Tom Wolfe. There was a good showing for this tree identification program. Tom's knowledge of trees and shrubs is astounding. He is so

generous with his time and will be doing more tree programs this year. You won't want to miss them.

■ *Bluebirds*. The end of March has Charlotte Lukes returning to do a program on bluebirds. She continues to be heavily involved with the Bluebird Restoration Association of Wisconsin and is helping Newport with placement of bluebird boxes. The boxes will be monitored throughout the breeding season. Watch for opportunities to help. And also watch for more programs from Charlotte throughout the year, such as finding orchids and mushrooms in Newport, to name a few.

Also new this year will be an opportunity to be part of a rare plant monitoring program for the DNR. This citizen science project will be done several times during the growing season, depending on which plants we are monitoring. This is a great way to be the eyes that truly help enlighten all. I will be going to Green Bay in early April for training, so stay tuned on that.

Spring will have us in the park soon, searching out all signs of life. Whether it be spring ephemerals, ferns unfurling, trees budding, birds migrating and/or nesting, or other signs of the earth awakening, it is the time to really pay attention and look around you. As with many of my programs, we will be doing just that. I look forward to you joining me on the trails!

Enjoy a beautiful Spring Day in your Newport Wilderness Park!!!






N.W.S. TREASURER'S REPORT - FISCAL YEAR TO DATE ENDING JANUARY 2017 by Neil Smith

The Society's revenue for the first seven months of the fiscal year was \$21,773, 13% more than the same period last year. Increased merchandise sales and memberships contributed to overall growth, while donations were less than last year. Year to date expenses of \$11,184 were above last year and reflect increased spending on advertising, park programs and the purchase of merchandise for resale to support increased sales.

Net worth increased to \$166,982 as of the end of January. This increase was due to the operating performance (revenue less expenses) discussed above plus earnings from our investments. The endowment fund totaled \$85,152, and remains the largest single component of net worth.
