
Two things from our Friends of Wisconsin State Parks:

## **DID YOU KNOW?**



Newport has been part of the Monarch Larva Monitoring Project for 2 years now. Our naturalist Beth Bartoli and volunteers Jim Blair and Debbie Wolfe are out in the test area counting eggs, larvae (including which instar they are at), chrysalis's and adult monarchs. This laborious task is done plant by plant, every week that milkweed and monarchs are present. Also recorded are temperature in the shade, rainfall, plants that are blooming in the area, if aphids are present and anything that may be going on in the garden area. MLMP is run by Monarch Lab through the University of Minnesota. We are excited to be part of this international project.

## A Walk in the Woods

Some of the frequent questions we get this time of year are, "What is that plant growing so profusely in the woods with the big, fuzzy, maple-like leaves? The berries are turning red. Are they edible?"

This is the native Thimbleberry (*Rubus parviflorus*), a shrub that typically grows in northern boreal forest climates. Rare within most areas of WI, it is found only in far northern Michigan and its Upper Peninsula, west through northern Wisconsin, and into the Pacific Northwest (according to the <u>UW-Green Bay Herbarium</u>). Thimbleberry needs cool summer temperatures to thrive.

The flowers are large, white and showy, with fruit showing up by late summer. Their berries, actually a drupe, resemble raspberries but are much more fragile. This looks to be an excellent year for thimbleberry fruit. With enough patience, one would be able to pick enough for a pie or some jam. Please remember to leave some for the many birds and animals that feed on these delicious fruits!
